QUESTION ONE (30 MARKS)

- a) Identify three characteristics of the literature of the African diaspora, paying attention to the three epochs (Transatlantic Slave Trade, process of decolonization and assorted reasons of migration). (6 marks)
- b) Discuss the significance of Harlem Renaissance in advancing the literature of the Diaspora : (4 marks)
- c) Discuss with examples from a play covered in this how Literature of the African Diaspora addresses: (4 marks)
 - (i) injustice
 - (ii) alienation
- d) Discuss how slave narratives address; religious redemption liberation and culture (6 marks)
- e) Using a play covered in this unit illustrate the use of language styles in articulating concerns of the Africans in the diaspora (5 marks)

- (f) Using examples from a novel covered in this unit, discuss two thematic concerns of the author (5 marks)

QUESTION TWO (20 MARKS)

- a) With close reference the short story *Strong Horse Tea* by Alice Walker, briefly address two social interests of the writer (10 marks)
- b) Explore five language elements that point to the use of oral traditions in the prose fiction of the African Diaspora, drawing examples from relevant texts (10 marks)

QUESTION THREE (20 MARKS)

- a) Using a text from one of the three epochs of the African Diaspora migrations examine the use of literature to address social concerns. (10 mark)
- b) Using any of the novels covered in this unit; analyze the use of imagery in the articulation of the themes of identity and discrimination (10 mark)

QUESTION FOUR (20 MARKS)

- a) Using the play *A Raisin in the Sun* by Lorraine Hansberry, discuss the themes of culture and racism (10 marks)
- b) Using Abdulrazak Gurnah's *Gravel Heart*, examine how the themes of alienation and belongingness are brought out (10 marks)
